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### 10 free tools for online book marketing

Book marketing needn't carry a hefty price tag. There are plenty of free ways to promote your book - and plenty of free tools to help you, too. We've scoured the web for ten of our favourite online marketing tools - all absolutely free to use.

Did we miss any? Please leave your tips as a comment below.

#### 1. Photofunia

This fun photo app is also useful for creating book marketing images. Upload your book cover to one of their templates and your book could be on display on billboards, in magazines or even just in the hands of smiling readers. Pretty simple – and yep – pretty free.

#### 2. Goodreads giveaway

Goodreads is a great free social networking site for readers and offers a whole host of free marketing tools in their <u>author program</u>. Our favourite of these is the Goodreads Giveaway – an easy way to get hundreds of readers bidding to win a copy of your book (and hopefully adding it to their 'to-read' lists whilst they're at it).

#### 3. Twiteriod

When's the best time to tweet a link to your book? This handy app will analyse your twitter account for you and let you know. It'll then help you put these tweets into action, or you can schedule them with a free social media management service such as <u>Hootsuite</u>.

#### <u>4. Mailchimp</u>

Newsletters are perfect tools for turning visitors to your website into readers, and your readers into superfans (<u>more advice on this here</u>). Mailchimp is a free email tool that makes managing and creating emails a bit of a doddle. (For an example of a good newsletter, <u>make sure you're signed up for ours!</u>)

#### 5. Google alerts

Have a book about a particular topic or location? Google have a useful alert tool that enables you to set up notifications for when these are in the news. If 'sports doping' becomes big news overnight, then you can capitalise on the exposure by sending out press releases about your book on the subject. Never miss an opportunity!

#### <u>6. Newsle</u>

Similar to Google alerts – but focused on those 'potentially-useful' contacts you've been collecting at events. This handy app connects with your social media and lets you know when your friends are in the news. Then you can reconnect with them by sharing their article, or dropping them a line to see if they need a hand...

#### 7. BookCrossing.com

'If you love your books, let them go". A fun way to increase the amount of people reading and sharing your book. Register a copy with BookCrossing and then leave it in a public place. Hopefully, you'll then be able to track where it goes and what people think when they read it.

#### 8. After the deadline

Not a marketing tool per se – but a tool that will help ensure any marketing efforts you do are as good as they can be. This Chrome extension will help correct your spelling, grammar and style in everything from your tweets to your blog posts. Handy.

#### 9. Audacity

Thinking of starting up a podcast, or publishing some audio content on your website? This free software helps you record and edit audio content. Afterwards, why not pop your podcast on <u>AudioBoom</u>, or your short story reading on <u>MacGuffin</u> to engage new readers?

#### **10. ShareThis**

If you've spent ages crafting a blog post, you'll probably want to make sure it's read by as many people as possible (more tips on blogging for authors). Make your post is easy to share with this nifty app - it's easily embeddable and you can keep track of how many people have liked your content enough to tweet it.

## WHERE THE HECK IS MY ART?

Over our lifetimes as an artist, all of us will probably create hundreds of pieces of art. When first starting out, it may seem anal and a waste of time to develop a recordkeeping system to track your work. When I created Art-Tique with fellow artist Lea Adams, one of the purposes of the organization was to find low-cost places where artists could show and sell their work. It was then I discovered the pitfalls of having a lot of art in many different venues! Many times artists would fail to pick up their art at the designated time because they didn't remember when it was due to be retrieved or which venue they had placed it in! For my own sanity, I created the **Art Location Sheet** that I began handing out free to everyone. It is a simple sheet arranged this way:

- ITEM 1—Art Title
- ITEM 2—(optional) Media
- ITEM 3—(optinal0 Subject
- ITEM 4—Date of receiving for show or exhibit
- ITEM 5—Show name
- ITEM 6—pick up date
- ITEMS 7, 8, 9-past three shows or exhibits

Although it can also be kept on paper in a ledger, I prefer the computer worksheet format because it can be sorted many times by the location so it is very easy to see not only where a particular painting is, how many paintings I have at that location, and when they are due to be picked up. This report also provides a quick reference if I have previously entered it in a particular show. If you keep the Current Location Sheet and the Art Information Sheet updated, you always have records of your work and where it has been.

The Art Information Sheet is a one-page record of each art piece created, and should have the following items:

ITEM 1—a pictorial image of your work. This can be in the form a printed photograph, a slide or a digital image. If your work is 3deminsional, be sure to take photos of all sides of the work. Since this image is not going to be used to reproduce the work, a small, low-resolution image will suffice. The image should be large enough to see details of the work, clear and without blurring.

ITEM 2—the title of your work, size, style/genre and when it was finished. Knowing *when* you created a piece of art might become important if someone pirates your work and sells it because who created the art first often decides who has the copyright. If you have no record of when an art piece was created, you might even be found in violation of your own work!

ITEM 3—a brief description of the work. I suggest you use complete sentences because many on-line sites require this when uploading to their site. Optional—I also like to keep a kind of diary as to what I wanted to achieve, why I chose this image, and what was going on in my life when I created this art piece.

ITEM 4—Keywords to be used when downloading the photo of your art to your web site or other internet media so you can just copy and paste.

ITEM 5—A Show and exhibit record is a list of what shows or exhibits were entered, when they took place and if the art won awards.

ITEM 6—wholesale and Retail price. This is probably the hardest thing for an artist to decide on—how much to charge for an artwork! What is the difference between Wholesale and Retail? Wholesale is always lower than Retail. Your wholesale price at a minimum should cover the cost of what it cost you to create the art, plus any gallery commission fees and hopefully with a small profit margin. Retail price for an art piece should cover all this plus what you as an artist feel the art is worth. I realize this is very subjective but most of art *is* subjective.

ITEM 7—Incidental information such as the date you formally copyrighted the work, cost of the copyright, etc.

ITEM 8—If you had limited editions of a painting or photograph or copies of a sculpture made, when, how many , how much it cost to make them, how many sold and how much you made when you did.

ITEM 9—the date you sold the original art and the name and address of the Buyer.

You also should keep three types of Photo records and 2 types of documentation of your art: A photo log with both highand low- resolution photos of your work, kept separately from your desktop computer. A working copy can be kept on the desktop, but be sure and back up your files each month onto a separate disc or jump drive. A record of each piece of art created and its disposition or current location. Keep back-up copies of these items in a separate place, And up-date your back-ups monthly. Once your records are lost due to computer crashes, natural disaster or any other reason they are gone.

I can't say this often enough; back up your data!

### **BLOG: THE PRACTICAL ARTIST**

#### IS YOUR WORK READY TO SHOW PROFESSIONALLY?

Art competitions add creditability to your portfolio. Entering and being accepted shows that you are serious about your art. It has the added benefit of exposure to the art world. If you are relatively un-



known as an artist, an art show is one of the easiest ways to put your work in front of the maximum amount of people in a short space of time. You should pick your competitions wisely however. Take a look at the events track record with regard to your target market. If you are marketing your art to the illustrative market or decorative items (cups, plates, clothing), you should be entering shows or competitions that are in that industry not fine art competitions. Typically, most art competitions produce an entry form called a Prospectus. Read it carefully to make sure that your work will meet acceptance standards as to hanging requirements and other criteria. And PLEASE, make sure of the following: your frame is clean and in good repair (a dusty, dirty frame

shows a lack of respect for your own work!), if your work is under glass, take the time to clean the glass before bringing it to a show! Not doing these things is the equivalent of sending your children to a fancy party in the same clothes they raked leaves in!

An artist is most likely to hear a critique of their work at a juried show. Are you mentally and emotionally prepared to have your work criticized or perhaps not accepted? Entering a juried show means you are putting your art out there to be judged. You should always enter what you consider to be your best work to date. Keep in mind though, that your art may *not* be accepted into the show. Does this mean that you are a poor artist? Or that your art is "bad"? Not necessarily. A juried art show is a subjective format and there are many reasons why your art might not have been accepted. It may simply mean that the space to display art was limited. Perhaps the art was good, but your presentation (framing/ matting) detracted from your art and the judge preferred art that was better presented. Or maybe this just *wasn't* your best work. Just because a show is classed as "open" might not mean that they are looking for your type of art to represent their show. If you are entering into a show that caters to representational art and your art falls into another genre such as abstract or illustration, perhaps you need to look for art shows and venues that appreciate the type of art you create.

If your art wasn't accepted by the judge into the show, you might consider having an artist whose opinion you respect critique the work for you. Informed criticism can be helpful. Please do note that I said *"Informed"* criticism; the person who does the critiquing should be a more experienced artist with some knowledge of technique and the principles of art. We love them, but the opinions of our friends and family who don't know any more than we do about art really aren't useful as critiques.

In some local shows, the judge may offer critiques as they judge, and a member of the art group putting on the show will have been assigned to follow and write down what is said. If you would like the judge to critique your work, you should approach the show chair as ask if this is permissible. *If the*  *judge offers a critique of your work, please pay attention.* This person was highly enough thought of by your local art peers to be paid to make choices and approve or disapprove the art presented to him or her. Above all, don't take this type of rejection personally. If the judge doesn't offer critiques while they are judging, (some of them prefer to do this privately) sometimes it is permissible to privately approach the judge and *politely* ask them what they liked or disliked about your work. If the judge is gracious enough to do this, always thank him or her, and please, *please*, don't argue with their opinion even if you don't agree with it.

For many of us, giving our work over to an individual or a group to be analyzed is scary, but so much can be learned by having someone not intimately connected to you evaluate your work. An unavoidable truth in the art world is that all through your career all kinds of people are going to say all kinds of stuff about your art. Some of them will even tell you to your face. Others may write about it, post about it or gossip behind your back. An artist not only has to learn how to handle this nonstop blitz of feedback, comments, and criticisms, but also how to gage and respond to what is said, and most importantly, how to not take what is said personally. To get the most out of a critique, it is important to decide Before submit-



ting your work to a critique, what you really hope to gain from it. This is where some honest personal soul-searching can be useful. Most of us always try very hard to create the very best art we can. We put the total sum of our skill into every painting or sculpture. Unfortunately, when we ask, "how do you like it" we do usually hope for an endorsement of our efforts instead of an evaluation of what is technically wrong. Evaluate the person doing the critique. An important determination you have to make about responses to your art is whether a particular comment is based on the individual's personal tastes or is instead based more on their overall knowledge and understanding of the type of art you create.

Decide what you like about your painting before asking for criticism. The better you know what it is you like or dislike *before* receiving criticism, the better able you will be to evaluate what is being said. Listen to what is said, make sure it applies, and then ask yourself: "would it be better changed, or do I like it just the way it is?" Don't get defensive! Remember; a critique doesn't have to become an argument to win the critic over to your side.

Seek the opinions of your peers whenever possible. The more respect you have for the critic, the easier it is to accept the evaluation by the critic. It helps also if you attempt to understand his or her biases. We all have them. Some of us are technical sticklers and others like to see the breaking of rules.

Don't discredit positive feedback. Because we often feel guilty at accepting praise, It is often easier for us to accept negative criticism than praise.

Nationally known artists get rejected from shows also. Sometimes the judge just doesn't like the subject matter or maybe he/she doesn't care for the colors, or the shape, etc. Above all however, you should trust your own instincts. If you feel a piece of art is good, don't give up on it, enter it into another show with a different judge and see if you get a different decision.
