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EGGS AND RABBITS FOR EASTER

We live in the world so we can't help being influenced by it. Do you find yourself painting seasonally? By this, I mean are



you inspired in the spring to paint flowers or using an amber themed pallet in the fall. Since it is getting close to Easter, I thought I would include some information about traditional 'Easter Art'. Most of the "Easter Art" I found when I researched this blog was of two varieties. The old masters of course painted images of Jesus and the Resurrection. This is not surprising when you consider that a lot of art back then was commissioned by the Church. The card industry has been trying to establish the idea of sending cards for Easter for years. Vintage Cards usually had Angels, Easter Bunnies or kittens (when did they arrive in Easter traditions?), huge eggs and sometimes chickens. Like the kittens, I suspect they were included for their "cuteness" not because they are traditional subjects for Easter. Easter traditions are long and varied; on the one hand, we have the resurrection of Jesus Christ (Christian), Passover (Jewish), and the Spring Equinox (Pagan). Many families only attend services on Easter Sunday (Oh, excuse me the new PC is "Resurrection Sunday"). The new PC form is an attempt by Christianity to distance itself from Easter's pagan roots. When it was first being established, Christianity found it expedient to co-opt some pagan

celebrations and incorporate them into the new religion. Traditionally Easter is celebrated on the first Sunday after the <u>full moon</u>, very close to the Spring Equinox. In old Europe, the prevailing spring festival was a Saxon fertility celebration in honor of the Goddess Eastre, (earlier spelling was *Eostre*, derived from the Saxons' Germanic heritage) a Teutonic goddess of dawn, spring and fertility, whose sacred animal was a hare. The hare is often associated with moon goddesses; the egg and the haer (old spelling) together represent the god and the goddess, respectively. Pagan fertility festivals at the time of the spring equinox were common—it was believed that at this time, male and female energies were balanced. One of the main reasons the new Christian religion disapproved of the spring equinox celebration so much was the belief (not entirely unfounded) that it encouraged a freewheeling orgy.

Colored eggs, which we also associate with Easter, are of an even more ancient origin; eggs have been symbols of rebirth and fertility for so long no one can say when this tradition began. So where did modern traditions come up with the idea of a rabbit who brings eggs? There is a myth that says the goddess Eostre was passing through a forest one winter and found a bird dying in snow from hunger and cold. In pity, she turned the bird into a hare because hares have warm fur and can supposedly find food more easily than birds. Poor science here, but it sounds nice; The rabbit survived the winter and when spring came, it laid eggs because it used to be a bird (obviously, the change had been only skin deep). The appreciative

Rabbit then decorated the eggs it laid as a sign of gratitude to Eostre. German settlers in Pennsylvania brought the tradition of seeking decorated Easter eggs with them to America and the Easter Egg Hunt was born.

Like Thanksgiving and Christmas, Easter has its traditional food; Ham, special breads, and of course Chocolate. Easter egg hunts were fun as a child, but I do remember that my mother refused to allow us to eat the eggs because they usually had been lying out unrefrigerated and she was afraid of food poisoning. It's no wonder really that merchants keyed in on these



fears and decided that Easter was an untapped gold mine (gold foil that is). They began wrapping chocolate bunnies and eggs in colorful wrappings and the Cadbury Easter Bunny was born. The toy makers couldn't let this slide of course so they began marketing plastic eggs that could be stuffed with other candy and Easter baskets with toys. There is also the Easter Parade held in almost every town. Then of course, there is the fabled Easter Bonnet. As a child, I always got a frilly hat and a new dress for Easter, which was dutifully worn,

to the family get-together on Sunday afternoon.

All these items are infinitely usable as subjects for art; food such as eggs, ham, chocolate bunnies make good still life set-ups. If you are into figure are, children hunting Easter Eggs make a great subject. Or if you really want to get into the theme, there is always the resurrection or spring equinox as subjects.




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TIM DESMOND

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BILL DAVIS AKA TROWZERS AKIMBO

Bill Davis aka Trowzers Akimbo signs his paintings with this alias to avoid confusion with the myriad other Bill Davis' out there painting. He's yet to run into another artist name Trowzers Akimbo. A third-



generation artist, Bill grew up in the creative hothouse that is Venice California. Art instruction began with his mother at home and continued with the fantastic art teachers at Venice High School. His high school art teacher was Betty Edwards nee Bomeisler who wrote the influential book, *Drawing On The Right Side Of Your Brain*. Bill continued his education at the California Institute Of The Arts, which at the time was called the Chouinard Art Institute. He began at Chouinard's in high school with Saturday classes and went on to achieve a BFA from there while attending on a scholarship.

In addition to painting, bill has worked in commercial graphic arts for Hollywood TV commercials for which he has received a national primetime **Emmy** award. Bills commercial work has been included in the Society Of Illustrators Of New York's Annual/Illustrators, AIGA Graphic Design USA, American Illustration, Humor 1 and 2, Regional Design Annual and Outstanding American Illustrators Today.

Bill exhibits his paintings regularly and is honored to have received numerous awards and ribbons for his efforts. He works in both representational and abstract styles while using traditional vanishing point perspective and natural color in his representative work. When creating abstractions, he utilizes multiple viewpoint perspective (an approach pioneered by Cezanne, Picasso and Braque) and non-local color. His subject matter includes scenes from his personal experiences, imagined experiences, portraits of those he knows and others he's passed walking down the street.

Bill works with oils acrylics, watercolors soft pastels and any other medium he comes across. He regularly provides demos and teaches workshops in all those mediums. Bill (Trowzers Akimbo) will be the artist in residence at the Yosemite Art Center in Yosemite National Park this year from August 29th through September 3rd, where he will be taking participants into the park to paint Plien air with acrylics.

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BLOG: THE PRACTICAL ARTIST

COMMON AUDIT ISSUES FOR ARTISTS & GALLERIES

Probably the one agency that terrifies Americans the most is not the NSA, but the IRS and being audited by the IRS ranks up there with being on some mobster's hit list. The best way to avoid being audited is to know what items will considered red flags by the IRS. The following are a few audit issues looked at by the IRS that may be found in the examination of an art gallery or home studio. Unreported income through cashed checks from galleries to the artists leading to related returns to be examined; Barter transactions between artists and others in the art field:

Taxability and inventory assessment issues for trades between gallery owners and artists;

Avoidance of state sales taxes;

Treatment of ordinary income as capital gains by mischaracterizing inventory as investments;

Identification of sources who failed to file/report transactions through "cost of goods sold" by studying cancelled checks and payment/transaction records;

Framing costs not properly recorded;

A History of losses or very high travel and entertainment costs with low gross receipts suggesting potential Activity Not Engaged in for Profit pursuant to I.R.C. § 183;

Sales of artwork disguised as "loans" secured by art as collateral and possible "money laundering";

Other "financial status" indicators which show an artist's or gallery owner's reported income is incompatible to his or her lifestyle;

Potential issue on Non-Resident Alien Artist, Art Galleries, Dealers and Brokers (International Referral Required);

Artwork being deducted as a charitable contribution at fair market value rather than adjusted cost basis and/or not being taken out of cost of sales:

Business use of the home.

If the gallery purchases its inventory, there should be a very detailed inventory listing showing the purchase date, the purchase price, any restoration and framing costs, the sales date, and price.

If the gallery sells on consignment, there will be a system in place to track consigned items. This system will generally contain the artist's name, his or her address, a description of artwork, the date on which the artwork was received by the

gallery, the asking price by the artist, and any other specific terms. It also indicates the date the piece was sold, the sales price, and terms of the sale.

The sales invoice for an art piece needs to display the buyer's name, address, date of sale, amount paid (if not fully paid), terms of any installment plan, sales tax, shipping charges, and framing charges if it is the type of artwork that would require framing.

Since artists are not offering a service, galleries are not required to complete a Form 1099 for the payments made. However, artists should receive a consignment check either monthly, at the time of sale, or at a time specified in an agreement between the artist and the gallery.

The best way to keep issues like those above from impacting your career as an artist is to keep good records for your home studio/gallery. If you sell your art, it is considered income and over a certain amount, it must be reported as such to the IRS on your federal taxes. If you participate in a booth event, you are usually required to have a seller's permit, collect sales tax, and then report and pay that sales tax to the State. Art is a business as well as a creative endeavor. Losing your art can be a financial loss. Not being aware of losing money because you don't keep track of costs can create a huge problem.

Hey, relax; this isn't as difficult as it sounds! Let's take this one step at a time, using one piece of work. Step one: decide in what form you are going to keep your work log. While it is very helpful to have this information stored on a computer, artists were tracking their work using paper files long before computers became popular. I personally prefer using a computer worksheet, however, all this stuff can be put on a sheet of paper and kept in a binder. For the initial record, I recommend a single sheet or worksheet per art piece. (Please see the Art Information Sheet in the Sample section)

ITEM 1—a pictorial image of your work. This can be in the form a printed photograph, a slide or a digital image. If your work is 3-deminsional, be sure to take photos of all sides of the work. Since this image is not going to be used to reproduce the work, a small, low-resolution image will suffice. The image should be large enough to see details of the work, clear and without blurring.

ITEM 2—the title of your work, size, style/genre and when it was finished.

ITEM 3—a brief description of the work (use complete sentences—why will become clear later). Optional—I also like to keep a kind of diary as to what I wanted to achieve, why I chose this image, and what was going on in my life when I created this art piece.

ITEM 4—Keywords to be used when downloading the photo of your art to your web site or other internet media.

ITEM 5—Show and exhibit record is a list of what shows or exhibits were entered, when they took place and if the art won awards.

ITEM 6—wholesale and Retail price. This is probably the hardest thing for an artist to decide on—how much to charge for an artwork! What is the difference between Wholesale and Retail? Wholesale is always lower than Retail. Your wholesale price at a minimum should cover the cost of what it cost you to create the art, plus any gallery commission fees and hopefully with a small profit margin. Retail price for an art piece should cover all this plus what you as an artist feel the art is worth. I realize this is very subjective but most of art *is* subjective.

ITEM 7—Incidental information such as the date you formally copyrighted the work, cost of the copyright, etc. More about copyrights later in the Copyright section.

ITEM 8—If you had limited editions of a painting or photograph or copies of a sculpture made, when, how many , how much it cost to make them, how many sold and how much you made when you did.

ITEM 9—the date you sold the original art and the name and address of the Buyer.
